Christmastide?

The early church fathers developed the church calendar as a means of directing the weekly worship of the Church through a broad selection of doctrinal topics. This is helpful because it allows us to be intentional in ensuring that we engage the complexity and diversity of what God has revealed to us about Himself. They also developed the calendar as a means of setting the rhythm of the seasonal lives of the people of God to be shaped around the gospel story, as opposed to the pagan and animistic seasonal rhythms available in their culture.

By the time of the Reformation, the medieval church had turned the calendar into a compulsory system the observation of which was a part of the system of earning salvation which the church erroneously taught. Responding to this, many of the reformers rejected many aspects of the church calendar.

Today, as the Church functions in a pluralistic society which more closely resembles the Roman Empire of the early church's context, we confront new problems. The sentimentalism which the Church often retreated into in the face of Modernism has led to the familiar "Hallmark® calendar" which much of our culture observes. We want to lean against this trend by using an older and more nuanced tool of the pre-modern church to orient our worship to God in all of His complexity and nuance.
